Attempts at measuring the condition of the U.S. economy has resulted in differing views from economists on the state of the national economy. To best address the uncertainty aspect as it relates to Arizona and Yavapai College, this report will focus on the views and predictions expressed by Arizona economists as reported by the University of Arizona Eller College of Management and other sources.

## **Summary Highlights**

- The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act is expected to bring \$787 billion to the U.S. economy with \$53 billion is allocated for education and workforce development nationally.
- Community Colleges are expected to play a major role in the national stimulus with the vocational training of displaced workers.
- Arizona has been hit hardest (with the exception of Nevada) and the recession is expected to last into 2010. It is expected to take until the end of 2012 for employment levels to regain the peak of 2007 (3QTR).
- Yavapai County population estimates project the area population to increase by 12% overall in the next five years. The fastest growing category is in the 25 to 39 age group.
- The top five occupations with projected job openings over the next ten years include health care and vocational jobs. Yavapai College has programs in place for the top five occupations.

## **National Outlook**

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act is historic legislation designed to improve the country's dire economic condition. The final legislation includes spending and tax provisions with a total price tag of \$787 billion.<sup>1</sup>

President Obama has charged community colleges to take the lead in this process. Community Colleges are expected to play a major role in the national economic stimulus with the vocational training of displaced workers. By offering programs that support demand from the local community, community colleges can be a vital partner in the development of a region's workforce.

More than 44% of all undergraduates attend one of the more than 1,177 community colleges that exist in the United States. As economic costs continue to rise and universities limit enrollments, community college attendance can expect to increase during hard economic times.<sup>2</sup>

The cost advantage public community colleges offer is an annual tuition, on average, of \$2,402, while public four-year college tuition averages \$6,585 (+274%).<sup>3</sup> Yavapai College annual tuition for 2009/10 full-time students is \$1,740 (28% less than the national community college average).

## **Arizona Outlook**

The economic recession has hit Arizona hardest (with the exception of Nevada) and is expected to last into 2010. The current recession has not bottomed out and is expected to exceed the recessions of the mid-1970s and the early-1980s. Research from the University of Arizona's Eller College of Management suggests the bottom to come in the second quarter of 2010. It is expected to take until the end of 2012 for employment levels to regain the peak of 2007(3QTR).<sup>4</sup>

Other highlights from the research from the University of Arizona Eller College of Management:

- The lion's share of losses will be in the construction industry. The construction industry will lose half of its workers over a four-and-a-half year slide from its 2006 (2QTR) peak to the bottom in 2010 (4QTR).

- Personal income increased by only 2.7% in 2008, the smallest increase in at least four decades. Aggregate income is expected to decline by 1.1% this year and grow by only 1% in 2010.
- Declines in retail sales (including restaurants and bars, food, and gasoline) also have been unprecedented. This aggregate sales measure fell 4.6% in 2008 and would have been worse were it not for the 8.2% increase in gasoline sales.
- Arizona's unemployment rate stood at 6.9% at the end of 2008. Unemployment is predicted to peak at 9.5% by year-end 2009, and average 8.8% for all of 2009 and 2010.

Since the beginning of the national recession in December 2007, Arizona's nonfarm employment levels have decreased by 257,700. Unemployment in Arizona is more than 8%.<sup>5</sup>

Yavapai County unemployment rate is 9.6% as of July 2009—slightly higher than the Arizona and national averages.

The new FY2010 federal budget revealed by the Office of Management and Budget, predicts the following for Arizona families:

- Tax cuts for 2.2 million families
- \$634 million for schools, students, and teachers
- \$5.3 billion in new funding for Pell Grants to help families pay for college over the next ten years. The Pell grant for college students for the next school will increase to \$5,550.

### **Yavapai County Outlook**

Yavapai County population estimates project the area population to increase 12% overall in the next five years (+26,267). The fastest growing category is in the age group 25 to 39 years of age, which is expected to grow 29% (+11,515) during the same time period. The age segment 40 to 49 years is expected to drop 4% (-1,070) by 2013.<sup>6</sup>

In 2007, in-migration to the county totaled 12,984 representing 6.1% of Yavapai County population. One-fourth of those migrating to Yavapai County came from Maricopa County, Arizona. Out-migration from Yavapai County totaled 9,126 representing 4.3% of Yavapai County population. All of the out-migration (with the exception of 2% to San Diego) went to other counties in Arizona.

## Occupational Outlook

The occupational outlook uses data from the Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES) and focuses on trends in the occupations with the most opening projected in Arizona (2006-2016) and require postsecondary training up through Associates Degree.
