## December 2013, Summary

- Changing needs for the type of space
  - YC had too many classrooms; not enough offices, student space, Labs
  - o Focus on renovation
- Grow space in PV
- Need more CTE space
- Fewer locations with more services
- Assumed 1.8% growth per year

## 2020 Updates

- Enrollments declined 16% as the economy improved
- Shift online and off-campus
- Lab space hard to replicate online
- CTE more important than ever in AZ
