Alcohol & Drug Prevention Programs



Y.C. Health & Wellness Club

The Yavapai College Health & Wellness Club was re-launched at Yavapai College. The club meets bi-weekly, has 13 rostered members and since re-forming, have met 5 times. All meetings include aspects of alcohol and drug prevention/awareness training, to encourage resiliency and healthy decision making as well as planning and hosting various campus activities and service projects.

Health & Wellness Club activities and service projects facilitated by the PFS Team in the first quarter included:

Participation in the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention "Out of the Darkness March" in October.



- There was great participation in various "Red Ribbon Week" Activities in October on the Prescott campus!
 - An interactive display in the cafeteria in the Prescott campus with information about the history of Red Ribbon Week, along with a signature board where students could share their reasons for choosing to be drug free.
 - Hosted an alcohol safety and prevention resource table in the "Quad" area on the Prescott campus. 29 YC students and staff members participated in the event.
 - Hosted a community-wide "Dump the Drugs" take-back event on the Prescott campus. 28 pounds of unwanted Rx medications were collected at the event and given to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) for safe disposal.









- PFS Team members attended a two-day virtual training on building resiliency, hosted by the Columbia University Medical Center-Department of Psychiatry and NASA.

Arizona State University Field Trip

ETS students from Bradshaw Mountain, Chino Valley and Camp Verde High Schools attended a tour of ASU Downtown and Tempe campuses on December 17, 2022, and about a variety of programs and majors such as health care, nursing, law, journalism, and media. Students met with faculty and students from both campuses and attended an informative presentation of ASU Barrett honors program to learn about the advantages of being part of Barrett, leading to grad school and leadership skills. The ETS goal is to inspires students to attend college and plan for their future. Students said that they can imagine attending ASU and reported feeling positive about attending college.



Financial Aid

This week the Financial Aid Department will complete the awarding of Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds (HEERF), to students and Families throughout the county. These are funds that helped students and families get through the COVID Emergency.

The funds were made available through the Cares Act, the Covid Relief and Recovery Student Aid Act (CRRSAA) and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) and resulted in over 15,000 separate awards helping over 7,000 Yavapai College Students and their families. Close to \$8.5 million in funds have been disbursed to our students since May 2020.

This was in addition to the regular awards that are administered by the YC Financial Aid Department to help students and families throughout Yavapai County realize their educational dreams.

YC Food Pantry

Yavapai College Food Pantry has received a \$4,200 grant from the Arizona Food Network. The funds are earmarked for a larger capacity refrigerator/freezer. The Food Pantry serves between 30 and 40 students a month.

The Faculty Association presented the YC Food Pantry with a \$250 check at the December Winter Celebration. The Staff Association did a food drive for the pantry and the Nurses Association did a personal hygene drive.
