### October 2024 Board Highlights

#### **CTE Chino Valley, Division 1**

• **Justin Brereton**, Agribusiness Professor, shared the exciting preparations for the Harvest Fest at the YC Chino Valley Center, October 5<sup>th</sup>. Over the past three semesters, the Horticulture students engaged in firsthand learning experiences that culminated in this exciting event. The students cultivated a variety of plants for sale, including our specially designed combo hardy fall containers. Additionally, the pumpkin patch, corn patch and maze were planted during the summer and were ready for community enjoyment. A unique feature this year is the colorful popcorn, which visitors picked directly from the corn maze. This event not only highlights the hard work and dedication of our Agriculture students but also serves as an opportunity to promote the Agriculture and Horticulture

programs at YC. Any plant sale proceeds from the festival will support future projects, ensuring that we can keep purchasing consumable supplies that continue to increase in cost and quantity as this program grows!







Agricultural Sciences have been collaborating with the leadership of the YC Eatery to enhance the students' experiences with production and delivery processes. Their ongoing efforts focus on identifying how they can best support their needs while applying the knowledge gained through their agriculture classes. Additionally, the students are transforming all the green kitchen scraps into compost at the AG Center. This initiative relies on a dedicated team of students who manage the timely delivery of fresh fruits and vegetables to the Eatery and return with compost for future use. They are exploring the possibility of composting biodegradable cups, plates and containers to expand the project further.









 Plant Biology Students celebrated their 8<sup>th</sup> year of tree planting at the Chino Valley Center. Each year these dedicated students researched and planted 6 new trees, contributing to a total of 48 trees over the past eight years.

Key Achievements include the following:

- Growth Rate Evaluations: Students analyze growth rates and collect valuable data, leading to insightful discoveries.
- Data Repository: YC is becoming a key resource for plant information, fostering a legacy of knowledge.
- Plans: We aim to enhance access to our trees and install permanent signage for better educational outreach.
- Cross-curricular: Plant Biology, Soils, Horticulture, and Water Management students all have an educational, maintenance, and oversite role in this great project

Through their hard work, students are leaving a lasting legacy at YC, nurturing the next generation of researchers!

YC's Marnee Zazueta is now Dean of the campus she helped create.

Some people find their niche in this life. Some carve their own. It's accurate to say **Marnee Zazueta**, Yavapai College's Chino Valley Campus Dean, climbed to the top of the academic ladder. But she built the ladder first.

"I am a Chino Valley girl," she says. "Grew up here from Kindergarten, went to Chino Valley High School." There, her monster work ethic caught the attention of Agriculture Teacher **John Morgan**. "John has been telling me, since I was 13, that I would be a teacher someday." Marnee was at U of A, pursuing a communications degree when Morgan tracked her down with a plan. "He'd joined Yavapai College, was starting an Agricultural program in Chino, and wanted me to do that with him." It was a vast, monumental task. But Marnee skipped her mid-terms, drove to Chino for an interview, and caught on as an Administrative Assistant.

Today's Chino Valley Campus – eighty acres of classrooms, laboratories, greenhouses, and farmland – was a distant dream when she arrived in 1999. "It was just open land, then. We had to find the property, build the curriculum, and hire teachers for the classes." From a lonely modular building, out between the antelopes, twenty-year-old Marnee got busy.

"We were holding classes while constructing the greenhouse. The early students helped us build the infrastructure from the ground-up." Marnee directed construction while finishing her bachelor's degree, then earned her master's from Oklahoma State University online. For her thesis project, she designed and taught her own course. "AGS 280: Zoo & Domestic Animal Care. It's still taught today, though it has evolved since then."

So has she. Over the next two decades, Marnee and the Chino Campus schooled one another. She became a senior administrator; then faculty, teaching a host of courses as more facilities, programs and opportunities popped up between the antelopes.

"Agriculture is such a wide-ranging field." The versatility required to raise crops or livestock requires an awareness and energy she finds invigorating. "When [students] come here, it's hands-on in all our programs." The philosophy applies to YC's Line worker and Commercial Driver training courses, too. "We have a saying over the door: The mind cannot forget what the hands have learned."

It's a spirit she shares at home with her husband, Rob, a Battalion Chief with Central Arizona Fire & Medical Authority, and her daughters Cora, 15, and eleven-year-old Sabreena. "I'm a mother of girls, raising future women. And I've always made it a point to show them [how to] work within our society, work within our community and contribute to a home."



Making Yavapai College "Hispanic" student-ready is a plan Lisa Raygoza, Manager of Hispanic Initiatives and Outreach, is proud to be a part of. Lisa met a student who shared his lifelong dream of becoming a truck driver. He worked in construction all his life and often saw big rigs drive by his worksite and "wished that one day [he] could drive one of those big trucks," but he did not think he would ever get the opportunity to do so. With the support of Yavapai College's Commercial Driver's License CDL team, today, this student is on his 2nd day of work at a new job driving a dump truck with his recently earned CDL. The student stays connected and reports that his income has more than doubled. He is home every night with his family and is committed to supporting other Latinos to earn their commercial driver's licenses at Yavapai College. This student also helped with the redesign our CDL Vocational English as a Second Language (VESL) manual to better support our Spanish speaking students. He appeared in the first promotional video sharing his experience with Yavapai College. After receiving his CDL, his text message read: "Thanks to God and to you all [YC]. You are a great team." Lisa and her student are pictured below.

Lisa genuinely appreciates the work of **Alex Barber**, YC's CDL VESL Instructor, for the organization and effective marketing plan of the CDL VESL program. Together, we have increased his student enrollment by 120%!




#### **CTE Prescott, Division 1**

• The Regional Economic Development Center (REDC) hosted the Prescott Valley Job Fair on September 17th with 382 attendees, the largest number since 2016. A total of 55 exhibitors participated, offering over 1,800 job opportunities. During the event, 13 on-site interviews were conducted, and 206 resumes were submitted. Additionally, over 226 connections were made between job seekers and employers.

#### **Instructional Support**

- The Learning Center, under Academic Affairs has been awarded recertification as a Level 1 certified tutor training program by the internationally recognized College Reading and Learning Association (CRLA). The Learning Center is certified through July 31, 2028. For more than thirty years CRLA has been a leader in learning assistance, reading, and academic support programs with almost 1,300 members and over 2,000 certified training programs worldwide. The Learning Center has worked hard to develop a tutor training program that meets CRLA's rigorous standards and has successfully completed the International Tutor Training Program Certification (ITTPC) peer review process. Achieving certification means that the Learning Center has met CRLA's high standards for tutor selection, training, direct service, and evaluation as an integral part of their overall tutoring program.
- Yavapai College's annual renewal application was approved by the AZ State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (AZ SARA) Council on Thursday, September 5<sup>th</sup>, 2024. The State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) is an agreement among member states, districts and territories that establishes comparable national standards for interstate offering of postsecondary distance education courses and programs. This means that Yavapai College has approval for offering distance education courses to students that live outside of Arizona in other SARA approved states.

- Assessment Day 2024 was held on Friday, September 13th<sup>th</sup> for all full-time faculty and cocurricular staff at Yavapai College. Yavapai College supports the assessment process by supporting an annual Assessment Day in September hosted by the Office of Instructional Support and the following faculty committees: Student Learning Outcomes Assessment, Curriculum, and General Education. Activities during assessment day are designed as both professional development in the areas of course and program assessment and a work session for faculty to engage in dialogue that allow them to discuss assessment results, complete reports, and to make assessment plans for the coming academic year. There were 139 participants, including 87 faculty and 52 staff and leadership members. The day offered four tracks (Assessment Foundations, General Education Assessment, AI in Assessment, and Assessment Processes) and separate cocurricular assessment session for Student Affairs and Library Services.
- The Center for Learning and Innovation hosted an entire class for a Skin lab, where students were able to label parts of a chunk of skin. And some discovered how to make their own post it notes! Big thanks to Robyn Bryce, Lynn Durkee, Ustadza White, James Rider and Roy Sandoval for helping Kathleen Tallman's Biology class have a successful experience in VR.



 On September 4, Carol Beard presented as part of the Library's Distinguished Guest Lecture series. Her presentation was Leaders Eat Last? How Servant Leadership Changed My Life. Carol explored Servant Leadership and shared a pivotal life story from the time she served in the US Navy. Carol's journey of how the "Bad Chief Petty Officer" turned into the "Good Chief Petty Officer" taught her what leadership should be. Carol Beard is an Academic Advisor and Success Coach in YC's TRIO Student Support Services. Before her current role, she worked in the Veteran Services department and TRIO Veteran Upward Bound at YC helping her fellow veterans access their educational benefits. Carol obtained her Associate of Arts at YC. She went on to complete her Bachelor of Arts: Interdisciplinary Studies; Community Development and Sustainability at NAU, and her Master of Science in Leadership at GCU.




• On Friday, October 4, the Library collaborated with the Riders Read program and the Prescott Art Gallery to present An Evening with Jenn Northington. Jenn is one of the co-editors of the book, Fit For the Gods. Her book is an anthology of gender-bent, queered, race-bent, and inclusive retellings from the enchanting and eternally popular world of Greek myth. Zeus, Athena, Apollo, Aphrodite, and the other denizens of Mount Olympus feel as present and larger than life today as they did when they were worshipped as gods. Humanity has been telling and retelling stories about the characters from Greek and Roman myth for centuries—heck, the Romans liked the Hellenic originals so much, they remade them faster than Marvel remakes Spider-Man movies. And from Virgil's Aeneid to Xena: Warrior Princess to Percy Jackson to The Song of Achilles, the obsession has never waned.

Yet *Fit for the Gods* shows how these stories still have a power of metamorphosis that would impress Ovid. Brave, bold, and groundbreaking, the stories in *Fit for the Gods* will be like ambrosia for those craving fresh interpretations of their favorite myths and give long-time fans a chance to finally see themselves in these beloved legends.





Al Kaminski donated the work. Al was an adjunct science professor at Yavapai College who also enrolled in and enjoyed the college art classes. When Al moved from his home, he and his daughter offered the donation to Yavapai College because they wanted to honor Dick's impact on the College Community.

Dick Marcusen was one of the founding members of the Yavapai College Art Department. He began teaching at the college in 1971. Over the course of Dick's 30 years at Yavapai College he taught Jewelry, Sculpture, Three-Dimensional Design, Welded Metal Sculpture, and Woodworking. He served in the Faculty Association Senate, as a Senator and the Association President. During his last eight years with the college, he was the Department Chair of the Visual and Performing Arts Department.



Although Dick preferred to create physical sculpture and fought to maintain and build the

foundation of a fine arts program, he welcomed and encouraged the new developments and technologies of digital media into the art program.

Dick Marcusen's artwork can also be seen on the Prescott Campus in the Yavapai College Sculpture Garden. Dick was instrumental in creating the Sculpture Garden while collaborating with the Friends of Yavapai College Art. He considered the Sculpture Garden to be a vital component of the community providing a much-needed quiet, contemplative space where visitors can enjoy fine examples of contemporary sculpture. This new



sculpture on the Verde Valley Campus extends that sentiment throughout the district.
