# October 2025 Board Highlights

## Agriculture, Division 1

#### Viticulture, Enology, and the Southwest Wine Center

The grapes are off the vines, but irrigation repairs and improvements filled the October month of practicum for the vineyard students (ref: VEN Student photos). Aged connections have been replaced with new ball valves allowing greater irrigation precision for the 2026 growing season.

The VEN program was awarded a \$1,500 grant from APS, with the help of Janet Regner and FoSWC, to purchase modern soil moisture monitors for the vineyard. The program hopes that this will allow for better water stewardship, with the aim of reducing water consumption at the site year-over-year.

The Southwest Wine Center will be hosting six performances, over three days, of "The Concert Truck" in conjunction with the Performing Arts Center. Attendance is free to the Verde Valley community, from Oct 16th through Oct 18th.

The VEN program was visited on Sept 24th by Dr. Matthew Laposata, Professor of Environmental Science at Kennesaw State University in Kennesaw, GA. Dr Laposata had originally published a case study on the SWC Vineyard revolving around water use, in the 7th Edition of his "Essential Environmental" textbook (Pearson), and came to update the next edition with additional photos and current information. The SWC vineyard will continue to be a focal point of Chapter 12 for students learning about water stewardship in arid climates!.





# **T** Horticulture

The Yavapai College Verde Valley Campus proudly hosted its first-ever Horticulture Symposium on 10/8/25, bringing together horticulture students, master gardeners, industry professionals, and gardening enthusiasts for a day of enriching discussions. Attendees enjoyed insightful presentations from expert speakers, including Noelle Johnson's "Essential Strategies for Thriving Gardens in Hot, Dry Regions," Dr. Kim Pegram's exploration of "Monarch Butterflies in AZ 💥," Dr. Shaku Nair's guidance on "Rodent Management in the Landscape," and Terry Gorton Vesci's tips on "Growing Lavender in AZ." Each participant received a copy of Noelle's book, "Dry Climate Gardening" and indulged in a delightful garden-themed lunch provided by Randall's

Restaurant. The event also featured giveaways, four lucky attendees winning gift certificates to Verde River Growers Nursery.



This successful symposium was made possible through the generous support of Verde River Growers, Baker Creek Heirloom Seeds, Johnny's Selected Seeds, The Arboretum at Flagstaff, and Yavapai College, marking a significant step in fostering community engagement and education in horticulture.

# **Verde Valley Career & Technical Education Event**

On 9/24/25, the Pathways to Careers Exploratory Day, sponsored by the Arizona Community Foundation (ACF), the Valley Academy for Career and Technology Education (VACTE), and Yavapai College, welcomed more than 200 students and community partners to the Yavapai College Verde Valley Campus for a day of exploration, connection, and inspiration.





The event showcased the broad range of Career & Technology Education (CTE) opportunities available in the Verde Valley through Yavapai College and VACTE, emphasizing how these programs prepare students for rewarding, high-demand careers. # YC Students Learn About Victim Advocacy Through AZ VINE Program

The Yavapai College Justice Institute recently hosted the Arizona Victim Information and Notification Everyday (AZ VINE) program—a statewide system that provides crime victims with real-time notifications when an offender is released from jail or prison.

## Custom-Built Hose Deployment Cart Enhances Fire Cadet Training

Yavapai College Fire Science students are training smarter and safer thanks to a new custom hose-deployment cart—a collaboration between the Fire Science and CTEC Welding programs.

Built by Students, for Students – Under the leadership of welding student Eli Humes, the cart was designed and constructed entirely in-house. This innovation saves the college more than \$8,000 compared to buying a commercial unit and allows complete customization to meet local fire-department training requirements.

#### Practical Benefits for Cadets

- Keeps cadets safe while mastering hose-deployment skills
- Enables rapid reset between drills for more repetitions and feedback
- Provides a stable ground-level platform that mirrors real engine operations

This hands-on project not only strengthens inter-program collaboration but also gives students meaningful, career-relevant experience.

#### YC Delegation Explores Advanced Manufacturing Partnerships at Semicon West

#### **Division Three, Film and Media Arts**

- This fall, the Prescott Film Festival received a \$5,000 grant from the Arizona Commission on the Arts!



- Manhattan Shorts was a wonderful opportunity for outreach for both the Film and Media Arts
  Program and the Prescott Film Festival. YC garnered over 30 new email subscribers, including
  several who would like to be invited to the PFF fundraiser next month.
- The film program was thrilled to support FMA instructor Jesse Ickler as he wrote, produced, and edited a short film called Imagine a Cave, based on Plato's Allegory for the Cave from his book The Republic. The film was screened during the YC Art Gallery's "Transforming Traditions" exhibition. It was well received with many actors and crew attending, including two people from Tucson! Helen will be submitting the film-to-film festivals for the next few months.
- The Visual Arts Department once again took part in the annual Prescott Area Artist Studio Tour during the first weekend of October. This popular event invites the public into working studios across the region, including our own spaces dedicated to woodworking, sculpture, printmaking, ceramics, jewelry, and more. Students and faculty engaged visitors with live demonstrations, offering an inside look at the creative processes that define our department.





The Prescott Art Gallery opened Transforming Traditions: Art and Folklore in 2025 on October 3 with a public reception and awards ceremony. A collaboration between the Art Gallery and Dr.
 Suzanne Waldenberger, YC Professor of Folklore and Humanities, Transforming Traditions includes folklore-inspired work by 30 artists from around the country. More than 100 people attended the opening reception, and Dr. Waldenberger awarded monetary prizes to three artists whose work best expresses the themes of the exhibition.





 The Patty McMullen-Mikles Art Gallery proudly opened Achromatic, a juried exhibition exploring the nuances of black, white, and grey. Local artist and gallery owner Joseph Robertson served as juror, presenting awards to outstanding works. The exhibition features pieces by 29 artists from across the United States, and its opening reception drew over 75 attendees—highlighting yet another vibrant and successful arts event for the Verde Valley community.








OLLI goes International! – Well, actually, OLLI has been international for some time. OLLI

#### Division Five, Business, Science Computer Science and Math

Yavapai College has recently been accepted as a Google AI Accelerator School. This national
initiative is designed to prepare students with critical AI and job-ready skills by providing free
access to advanced AI tools such as Gemini and NotebookLM, along with Google's Career
Certificates and AI-focused training. The Accelerator offers rigorous, hands-on learning
experiences vetted by over 150 leading employers.

The benefits of this program extend collegewide, providing opportunities for both instructors and students to access no-cost AI training, certifications, and tools that enhance teaching and learning across disciplines. Specifically for the Computer Science Department, we will be embedding Google's AI content into our courses and aligning portions of our curriculum with their AI certifications. This will help ensure that our students not only gain cutting-edge technical knowledge but also earn industry-recognized credentials that improve employability.

- Since Fall 2023, Yavapai College has also been an *Intel AI for Workforce* institution. Our first pilot course, *Introduction to AI*, launched in Spring 2024 and has now run successfully for four consecutive semesters with steady enrollment. The course is embedded in both the AAS in Computer Systems and Applications and the new Bachelor of Science in Computer Science. The Intel program provides modular, hands-on content across AI domains, including programming, machine learning, computer vision, and natural language processing, supported by Intel's software tools, hardware recommendations, and industry use cases. The program equips students with technical, career growth, and social skills to thrive in AI-related jobs.
- Dr. Perry Baker, Dr. Philip Reid, and Robyn Bryce presented at the 2025 Arizona Community
  College Administrators Conference. Their presentation took place at a breakout session titled
  Future-Ready Community College Education at Yavapai College at the 2025 Arizona Community
  College Administrators Conference, October 13-15 in Tucson, Arizona. The session highlighted
  Yavapai College's innovative approach to leadership and student preparation for a fastchanging, technology driven future.
- On Saturday, October 4th, Yavapai College's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) proudly
  hosted the 2025 Fall Leadership Conference. Our YC chapter competed against students from
  Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and Arizona State University in a variety of events that
  tested their business knowledge, communication skills, and professionalism. Students
  showcased their talents through both objective tests and presentations, demonstrating the
  confidence and skills they've been developing this year.

In addition to the competitions, **Deanna Baker**, Co-Advisor, had the opportunity to lead a workshop titled "Going for the Goal." During the session, we explored how a simple shift in perspective—seeing "Opportunity isn't Nowhere" as "Opportunity is Now Here"—can change how we approach our goals. We also focused on setting SMART goals for educational, career, and financial success.

It was also announced that Deanna Baker will serve as the new Assistant State Advisor for Collegiate FBLA, where she will work towards growing FBLA Collegiate across the state, as well as providing opportunities to the collegiate members.

Finally, a heartfelt thank-you goes out to the Yavapai College faculty and staff who volunteered their time to serve as judges. Your support and participation played a key role in making this event such a success for our students and visiting chapters.
