#### Assessment Day 2021

Assessment Day 2021 was held on Friday, September 17<sup>th</sup> for all full-time faculty at Yavapai College. Yavapai College supports the assessment process by supporting an annual Assessment Day in September hosted by the Office of Instructional Support, the Office of Institutional Effectiveness and Research, and the following faculty committees: Student Learning Outcomes Assessment, Curriculum, and General Education. #### • AZ State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement Annual Renewal

Yavapai College's annual renewal application was approved by the AZ State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (AZ SARA) Council on Thursday, September 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021. The State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) is an agreement among member states, districts and territories that establishes comparable national standards for interstate offering of postsecondary distance education courses and programs. This means that Yavapai College has approval for offering distance education courses to students that live outside of Arizona in other SARA approved states.

#### • Professional Development Opportunities for Faculty

The Teaching & eLearning Support (TeLS) department is working with faculty to support YC's online courses to be the best they can be through training and quality assurance. Over the past three months, twenty-five of our amazing YC faculty have completed the Improving Your Online Course (IYOC) workshop, fifteen have participated in the Open Educational Resources (OER) training course, and thirty-five have completed our TEACH Online course, a 2-week course designed for new and experienced teachers who want to hone their online teaching skills.

## **YC Performing Arts Center**


• FMA'S In Focus Film Series worked with Student Services and screened *Tortilla Soup* on the Prescott and VV Campuses.

The TF Miller Building used to be an old grocery store that closed down in the '80s. The building has since been vacant. Drake Meinke is leading the grant writing effort to restore this space which is much needed if the town wants to attract more business to the Main Street area. Restoration will then YC construction students to participate by taking on a few projects, including building walls and the platforms for the window staging areas.
