School of Arts and Humanities

The event included 150 participants representing 18 chapters from throughout the State of Arizona. Participants attended workshops and lectures on the Theme of Transformations: Acknowledging, Assessing, and Achieving change. Yavapai College Professor, Dr. Mike Davis presented the keynote address.
- Lauri Dreher, Fast Track Management Program Director, attended the bi-annual Western Association of Food Chains (WAFC) Retail Management Certificate Update Meeting. Lauri represents Yavapai College as a member of this statewide Retail Management Advisory Group. The Advisory group is comprised of community colleges and retailers from across Arizona brought together to cultivate leadership and prepare retail workers for advancement in all levels of management.

The Retail Management Certificate (RMC) is an accredited business program that will give workers the skills needed to get started or advance their careers in the retail industry. The certificate has been recognized as part of the White Houses' Upskill Initiative, and leading organizations and foundations including the ACT Foundation and the U.S. Department of Labor. Yavapai College is an approved community college to offer the certificate which can be achieved in as little as 2 semesters of coursework.

Most of the retailers represented at the meeting indicated they pay employee tuition towards attainment of the RMC and use the certificate as a means of pay increases and promotion. Realizing the enormous enrollment potential, Lauri made personal contact with Fry's Senior HR Field Trainer and Sprouts VP of Field Development, and is working with both retailers to create marketing collateral for distribution to their employees to educate and encourage them to enroll at Yavapai College. Lauri will also be invited to present at retailer Division meetings to promote the program to retail managers.


