
# September 2021 Board Highlights

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The Broken horn D Ranch is located in the Yavanal County Hills with over 4000 acres of private and state leased land devoted to pasturing Corriente cattle. The headquarters is 130 acres with horse stables, hay barns, cattle, pens and chutes. Kim McEiroy is an Arizona Beef Quality Assurance Certified Producer. The BQA is a voluntary program that certifies that all cattle shipped from this ranch are healthy, wholesome and meet all state and federal standards. Her cattle meet the USDA standard as GRASS FED (all forage for the lifetime of the animal), NE3 for hormones, no antibiotics, no animal animal, NE3 for hormones, no antibiotics, no animal at the ranch. 



# Community Education is excited to offer in-person courses this fall! Registration is now open!

- Adult Community Education Classes: Over 100 offered with 20 online via Zoom.
- College 4 Kids Classes: Babysitter's Bootcamp and Cooking 4 Kids: Fundamental Skills.
- Recertification Courses: Six EMS courses offered.
- EDventures: 12-day trips offered and six virtual EDventures videos available.
- Companion Courses: 30 offered, nine of which have a total of 13 non-credit students enrolled.
- **Ed2Go Courses**: Partnership with ed2go, a third-party educational content provider, has ramped up and is currently enrolling with our first enrollees!
- **Chocolate Workshop**: Chef Mark Reese teaches an intensive chocolate workshop in November using the Sedona Culinary Arts Kitchens.
- DK Ranch: Community Education has scheduled 3 classes on the Cracchiolo DK Ranch Arizona Experiment Station, a research ranch in Cornville. Our classes will go forward as part of a partnership between YC and University of Arizona, the owners of DK Ranch.

### **Verde Valley Campus**

 In May, the Spring Horticulture class visited Fish's Garden, a commercial aquaponics business, in Camp Verde. Fish's Garden raises tilapia and bluegill and circulates the water in large raceways filled with rafts that grow mixed greens. Students explored the set-up, planting, and harvest process and learned the economics behind the operation. The owner, BJ Davis, also shared a path to employment as he encouraged the class to apply for part-time positions he has open.







• The Culinary Arts Program conducted its practical exams in May at the Sedona Center. Students were tasked with creating a plated dessert of their choice, which had to incorporate three elements: crispiness, smoothness (e.g., from sauces), and "meat," such as berries or nuts. Students also had to create two baguettes identical in length, weight, taste, and appearance. VACTE student Karla Ramos made a flourless chocolate cake with tuile, roasted walnuts, chocolate sauce, powdered sugar, and blueberry sauce.





In May, a ceramic sculpture from local Clarkdale artist Don Reitz was installed on the
east-facing wall of the Southwest Wine Center at the Verde Valley Campus. Mat Rude
who had worked with the artist, and Ben Roti, art adjunct faculty, spent a week
assembling and affixing the piece.
