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OVERVIEW

This report details Yavapai College District's expenditures for Proposition 301 funds during FY 06. Funding was used to enhance and increase workforce development programs that provide specific educational needs tailored to our rural county.

—Accountability Measures and Outcomes

College leadership agreed to enhance the science labs for nursing students on the Verde Valley Campus, and maintain previously funded projects including nursing, small business development, custom business training program, agribusiness, and independent film making.

1. Independent Film Making – Zaki Gordon Institute

Proposition 301 money was continued to be used in 2006-07 to support the start of a new certificate program at the Zaki Gordon Institute (ZGI). Money was primarily used to pay for part-time instructors. In this new certificate program, students at the Zaki Gordon Institute, learn how to take a feature film from a business plan to theatrical release.

Included in the curriculum is a deeper understanding of the crafts of filmmaking during a 35mm or high definition sort film production. A field trip to the participating venders in Los Angeles gives students a full understanding of the current filmmaking infrastructure available to them. From the trip they also gain an understanding of what the Institute will provide in the future to meet ZGI graduate's needs for their productions. This step brings ZGI closer to supporting a local film industry and workforce development.

2. Structured English Immersion (SEI) Education

All Preschool-Grade 12 teachers and administrators who hold Arizona Teaching Certificates were mandated to complete 15 clock hours of state approved training leading to a "Provisional Structured English Immersion (SEI) Endorsement" no later than the end of August 2007. Secondly, an additional 45 clock hours must be completed by 2009 by all currently certified educators leading to the full SEI Endorsement. Yavapai College designed two college courses, SEI 240 and SEI 241, to meet these training needs which were both approved by the State Department of Education and the College's Curriculum Committee in the spring of 2005. Courses were specifically designed to prepare educators to better meet the academic needs of their English Language Learner (ELL) populations and include professional development work in SEI theory, methods and strategies as required by the State of Arizona.

Administrators recruited, trained and credentialed a cadre of SEI Adjunct Instructors who have been teaching these training courses across Yavapai County since May 2005 mostly at public and charter school sites but also at several of our College locations beginning in the summer of 2005. More than 820 Arizona educators have completed these training courses offered by Yavapai College to date with many additional courses already scheduled by school districts through the spring and summer of 2007. Yavapai College will continue to offer these SEI courses at least through 2009 but this training may continue to be needed by educators who come to Arizona from other states that do not require such training. All of Arizona's teacher preparation programs now include SEI training so all newly certified teachers presumably will not need this special training.

3. Agriculture Technology Management

Proposition 301 funds again augmented salary for one full-time faculty member. The program is making significant changes as the market continues to shift and funded faculty has spent considerable time making changes in curriculum. New certificate areas under construction include landscaping and veterinary assistant which are needed areas in Yavapai County with growth projections. In addition, the division is focusing more on the transfer market as the high paying agriculture industry side of the market is requiring advanced degrees.

The program had the largest enrollment jump in the college with numbers nearing 300 students. Most students are interested in the general ag degree for transfer, while others still flock to the equine portion of the program. A certificate in Zoo and Domestic Animal Management was added to the program.

4. Nursing and Allied Health

Proposition 301 funds provided salaries for three full-time clinical nursing instructors to allow for growth in the Nursing program. An additional two instructors were funded in cooperation with Yavapai Regional Medical Center and Verde Valley Medical Center. Both have proven to be tremendous business partners. Because of the Arizona state nursing shortage, there was a state mandate passed to increase the Nursing program.

The mandated increase caused a serious problem with existing science lab space resulting in the colleges' decision to build two science labs on the Verde Campus to

house the courses needed by nursing students including chemistry, anatomy and physiology, and allied health biology. Those labs are up and running and nicely equipped.

5. Custom Business Training Program/Small Business Development ProgramThis program provided customized training to a variety of businesses through the SBDC Center, Custom Training Solutions, and Business programs at Yavapai College. These included everything from developing business plans, marketing, finance, taxes, and ecommerce. The services were provided to over 400 businesses and potential businesses in Yavapai County.


