STUDENTS

Roughly **3230** undergraduate students and **80** graduate students make up our student body, and **just over half** are students of color. About **1/3** of students are the first in their family to go college, and first-year students enter with a high school GPA of **3.26**, on average. **41%** of students are Native American or Alaska Native, representing **177** Tribes and Native Alaskan villages.

98% of classes at FLC have fewer than 50 students. In fact, the average class size is 24, and the student to faculty ratio across all departments is 15:1. This means that you get individualized attention and mentorship that supports your transition from student to professional.

What's more, with an experiential approach to education across all 55 majors, you'll get a taste for the practical application of your studies through field schools, internships, original research, or other opportunities.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT

With the best view in town, FLC breathes human innovation into **247** acres sitting at **6,872** feet. **12%** of our "Tree campus" is xeriscaped with native and low-irrigation plants. **Over half** of campus energy comes from solar and wind power, and we have reduced carbon emissions by **58%** since 2011.

42% of students call campus their home while they're here, and enjoy a range of recreational options including a climbing wall, disc golf course, campus events throughout the year, and over 55 student organizations.
