#### School of Arts and Humanities

For most of us, performing one job well is enough of a challenge. But most of us are not Jerome (and sometimes Phoenix) resident Kelley E. Foy. She's held many job titles. She's a furniture maker, ceramicist, former restaurateur and a "gelato chef" at Merkin Vineyards. She also curates gallery shows at Yavapai College. But to her, this is not overwhelming. "I consider myself a maker. It's really about creating objects," says Kelley. "If I feel like I want to create something, then I'm inspired by a particular material or it's based on utility or the necessity of making useful space beautiful. In addition, **Karen Palmer** worked with **Professor Suzanne Waldenberger** and other faculty members including OLLI and members of the community to host eight weeks of Shakespeare on Stage this summer via ZOOM.

**Joshua Harper,** Associate Professor of Choral Music, completed his Doctorate (D.Mus.) from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, graduating virtually in May. His dissertation is now published online through IUScholarWorks. In July, **Joshua** attended the National Chorus America Conference where he attended many sessions on how to make the most of Choral Music in the time of COVID-19.

Nanette Hofer, Professor of Musical Theater & "On Hold" YC Director of CHICAGO, took part in an intensive Broadway Teacher's Workshop this summer. All Workshop leaders were working Broadway directors, actors, choreographers, designers and writers. Sessions featured professional Broadway artists such as the current Musical Director of the smash hit *Hamilton* to Legendary Broadway stars, Chita Rivera, Billy Porter and Patti Lapone, who shared their experiences from college students to emerging professional artists. Sessions focused on how instructors can encourage and challenge their students to use this time during COVID to focus on scholarly work while keeping their performing skills sharp. The workshop focused particularly on how to teach artists by using best practices with online platforms. Nanette expressed gratitude for the College support to help her become a better teacher in this new world of online teaching of Performing Arts students at Yavapai College.

# **School of Business and Computer Systems**

**Terry Lovell,** Professor of Business, completed the OER Course and had BSA130 and BSA 131 certified as Z Courses. The cost of textbooks went from \$200 and \$375 per student to FREE! That is a savings of \$8,625 in BSA 130 and \$11,400 in BSA 131 for a total savings of \$20,025 to YC Students this fall term!

Lauri Dreher, Professor of Business, represents Yavapai College as a member of the Western Association of Food Chains in which the "WAFC's vision is to be the recognized leader in identifying and facilitating food industry related educational programming that helps food industry associates become leaders within the industry. While not entirely constrained geographically, the focus for these efforts remains rooted in the 14 Western United States. The mission of the WAFC is to help the industry attract, retain and advance high potential food industry associates through exposure to educational programs and leadership opportunities."

Yavapai College was accepted into a new national drone initiative. The purpose of the UAS-CTI program is to create long-term relationships with institutions of higher education that focus on preparing candidates for careers in all aspects of UAS. The UAS-CTI program's goal is to collaborate with schools to deliver up-to-date UAS training that matches the requirements of the National Airspace System (NAS) and helps provide qualified applicants for careers involving UAS.

**Justin Brereton**, Agriculture Instructor, reports having the largest summer horticulture class ever due to a growing interest in gardening and plants as a result of people being home during the COVID. Brereton also recommends you stay tuned, as they expect thousands of pumpkins to be available soon, with the Fall Harvest Fest cancelled.

**Marylou Mercado**, Director of Nursing shared the following pictures of Verde Nursing Students using the newly renovated Building L for skills lab. They love it!








**Stephanie Scovill,** Professor of Nursing, shared the following highlights from her summer:

- Stephanie wrote a grant for CARES Act funding for remote video/camera capabilities for the NSG143 and NSG153 Skills faculty; 3 iPads, with arms so procedures can be demonstrated remotely more effectively. She also wrote a grant for CARES Act funding for outside vendor resources for students for simulation, including medication administration, case studies/prioritizing, application of skills in a virtual simulation setting in a variety of patient care specialties.
- The Nursing skills team collaborated to optimize student face to face time, while keeping
  it safe, physically distanced, and enabling contact tracing should a case of
  COVID-19 occur. This is a delicate ballet on the Prescott campus, and the
  students are doing a great job.

Nursing is working to cover deployment of one of our own, in the USAF reserves.

**Josh Schmidt,** PHE Instructor, shared the following summer accomplishments and action-packed photo:

- Josh taught a swift water rescue class on the Colorado River for Yavapai County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue Team (100% volunteers).
- Recertified in Helicopter Short Hall with the Department of Public Safety. (100% volunteer)
- Completed the EMS 132 Emergency Medical Technician Class. Josh was a former EMT but needed to recertify. This was a 10 credit class.
- Recertified Rescue 3 International Rope Rescue in both operation level and technician level. This is a 60 hour course.
- Recertified in Firearms Arizona Peace Officer Standards with YC PD and Yavapai County Sheriff's Office. This has to be completed every year. (100% volunteer)
- Participated on an average of 25 Search and Rescue Team calls. The team is made up of 100% volunteers which includes several full time YC Faculty and about a dozen former and current YC students!





### **School of Science and Engineering**

Jeb Bevers, Professor of Biology, received thrilling news from former student, Carissa Bond, who transferred to the University of Arizona. Carissa is the proud recipient of National Science Foundation-funded scholarship, the "ASEMS" (Arizona Science, Engineering and Math Scholars Program) S-STEM Scholarship. This scholarship is oriented toward full-time STEM transfer students who meet rigorous academic criteria and have demonstrated success in previous STEM coursework. ASEMS will support Carissa with up to three years of financial awards and academic guidance. This includes program-specific advising and tutoring, career and academic preparation (prep for entering the workforce or graduate/professional school) and research opportunities such as internships and lab shadowing. Carissa writes to Professor Bevers...This scholarship is an incredible resource, made possible by your support and dedication of your time and energy - thank you so much. Your influence has helped to propel me forward to this point and I am so grateful to have your continued encouragement to allow me this opportunity.

Marie Hardman, Prescott Valley Allied Health Instructor, is thrilled to report we successfully graduated all 39 CNA students from Spring 2020 semester. Clinical sites were unable to accept our students due to the coronavirus outbreak. In order to meet the Arizona Board of Nursing 40 hour clinical requirement, YC Allied Health Faculty created a "Mock Long Term Care Facility" which included resident care plans, electronic charting, dining rooms, activity rooms plus Skilled/Rehab resident rooms at the Prescott Valley Center. The students completed four 10-hour shifts on various days throughout June. Eleven students from the CNA Spring 2020 YC Proper cohorts chose to go on and State Test for certification or licensure. First time pass rates were 100% for the written exams and 91% for the skills exams – well above the state averages.

The YC Medical Assistant program was recently ranked #1 in Arizona this year by Medical Assistant Advice, an online resource that ranks programs based on total number of students enrolled, graduation rates, average net price full time retention rate and admissions rate. **Kathie Peterson,** Professor of Communication, is writing a chapter in a book she is coauthoring with friends. The name of their book is **Eating Fandom: Intersections Between Fans and Food Cultures 1st Edition** by CarrieLynn D. Reinhard (Editor), Julie E. Largent (Editor), and Bertha Chin (Editor). In Chapter 15 they discuss, *For the Love of Beer: Craft Beer Fandom* by **Kathie Peterson** and Julie E. Largent. The following is a synopsis of the book:

This book considers the practices and techniques fans utilize to interact with different aspects and elements of food cultures. With attention to food cultures across nations, societies, cultures, and historical periods, the collected essays consider the rituals and



values of fan communities as reflections of their food culture, whether in relation to particular foods or types of food, those who produce them, or representations of them. Presenting various theoretical and methodological approaches, the anthology brings together a series of empirical studies to examine the intersection of two fields of cultural practice and will appeal to sociologists, geographers and scholars of cultural studies with interests in fan studies and food cultures.



Similar information was covered in a shorter timeframe, with more in depth trainings on each topic offered in one hour segments via Zoom during the fall 2020 semester.

- Teaching & eLearning Support (TeLS) The Teaching & eLearning Support (TeLS)
  department provided districtwide support for the move to online learning in the wake of a
  pandemic. In addition, they steered the Open Educational Resources (OER) program to
  a successful launch this fall while continuing to offer professional development
  opportunities and course design skills to our faculty. The following is a result of the hard
  work from TeLS staff this summer,
  - o Instructors are equipped to offer the vast majority of classes in a virtual environment.
  - Faculty participated in the May 2020 Summer Institute as well as an August 2020 Mini-Institute to learn best practices in online teaching.

- The Open Educational Resource (No-Cost OER) project launched successfully this fall, with more than 60 OER course sections being offered.
- Worked with several departments, including the Nursing program to add course design consistency and quality assurance to courses in the program.
- Worked with many faculty as part of Innovation grant awardees through the CARES Act.
