YC's CDT program has expanded significantly over the past three years, now boasting three fully wrapped trucks. This program is a gateway to the workforce. As these trucks gain attention, more local companies are connecting with our students, creating job opportunities right after graduation. This is more than just training—it's a direct path to a successful career.



#### Yavapai College Drives Awareness with New CDL Program Truck Wraps

Yavapai College's Chino Valley campus has launched an innovative initiative to promote its educational programs by wrapping its Commercial Driver's License (CDL) program trucks with vibrant graphics showcasing the campus's diverse offerings.

This effort aims to increase awareness of the Chino Valley center's unique educational opportunities, which include programs in agriculture technology, aquaculture, linework and equine studies.

The CDL program at Yavapai College is one of the few community college-based truck driving programs in Arizona. Over the past three years, the program has expanded from a single truck to three, with the goal of using these vehicles as mobile billboards to promote the campus and its specialized training options.

"It's been about a three-year process," said **Steven Josh Hoover**, the CDL program instructor who spearheaded the initiative. "When I took over the program three years ago, I had just one truck, and it wasn't wrapped. Nobody really knows there's a campus out here in Chino Valley."

The project, which was finally realized with the support of college leadership, took time to gain momentum.

"It was just a matter of trying to find the funds to do it," Hoover explained. "It was a combination of people getting together saying, 'Hey, this is a good thing to do,' and once you got up the chain of command, they realized, 'Yes, this is a good thing,' and they managed to get the funding to get it done."

The wrapped trucks, which are 40 feet long and 10 feet tall, now travel extensively across the region, serving as moving advertisements for the college. The decision to wrap the trucks rather than use stationary billboards was strategic.

"Billboards are stationary, but if you've got a wrapped truck, and that truck is going from Chino Valley to Dewey, Chino Valley to Prescott, Chino Valley up to Ash Fork, the truck is mobile so it's a mobile billboard," Hoover said.

The wraps were completed by Auto Trim Plus in Prescott, with each trailer taking about four days to finish. The project was completed in July.

Hoover hopes this initiative will not only increase the visibility of the Chino Valley campus but also boost enrollment across all its programs.

"We've had great growth in our campus out here," Hoover said. "That's why I have three trucks now, because I've had the demand, so we had to get more trucks. As the demand grows and if it gets too much, then we will take the next step forward and get a fourth truck."

The CDL program itself plays a crucial role in the local economy, providing drivers for various regional companies.

"My students are actually able to graduate here and then go into the workforce," Hoover said. "I'm in contact with several companies that if they need drivers, they let me know and I send them their way. So, that's always a good feeling when a student can get a job right out of the gate."

The public response to the wrapped trucks has been overwhelmingly positive.

"I've had a couple of people tell me that, 'Hey, I've seen your trucks around town,' so that makes me feel good," Hoover said. "I actually had somebody send a picture of me driving down the freeway."

As Yavapai College continues to innovate in its outreach efforts, the CDL truck wraps represent a creative and effective way to connect with the community and highlight the educational opportunities available at the Chino Valley campus.

"It's an integral part of the infrastructure of the United States, I mean, without truckers, nothing gets delivered," Hoover emphasized. "So, I'm always trying to promote the program and the programs out here for what YC offers."

This project exemplifies our commitment to innovative outreach and community

engagement. **Josh Hoover**, Commercial Driving Professor, shared his excitement about the visibility this initiative has brought to our Chino Valley campus. #### Viticulture & Enology

The practicum students began their classes in the first week of August, aligning with the start of the grape harvest. As of now, about 29 tons of grapes have been harvested, marking approximately two-thirds completion of this season's harvest.

On August 31st, chefs from the American Culinary Federation prepared a special breakfast for over 35 volunteer pickers at our vineyard. This marks the third consecutive year of their generous contribution, enhancing the community spirit during the harvest.

The Southwest Wine Center has begun selling its first batch of student-produced distilled spirits, including a three-year barrel-aged Brandy, a rum, and two varieties of gin.

VEN instructor, **Paula Woolsey**, was honored as the 2024 Arizona Governor's Tourism Award, Hall of Fame Winner. This prestigious recognition was awarded at the Arizona Office of Tourism Annual Conference in Scottsdale. This is a well-deserved award recognizing the many years of Paula's impact on the wine industry. Sedona Biz - Paula Woolsey.

The Southwest Wine Center will be at the Sedona Winefest on September 28th and 29th. Concurrently, our first-semester students will participate in a grape camp lab at the college vineyard, providing hands-on learning aligned with the VEN 100 course.

Planning for the upcoming Wine and Dine event on October 19th is progressing smoothly, with the Friends of the Southwest Wine Center securing over \$40,000 in sponsorships. The event is already sold out, with a waiting list managed by the YC Foundation in case additional spots become available.

**Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs** visited the Southwest Wine Center, where she was welcomed by members of Yavapai College's executive leadership team and **Deb McCasland**, the chair of the District Governing Board. During her tour, the Governor explored the vineyard adjacent to the winery and toured the facilities of the wine center. She heard about our educational program and engaged in discussions about the students' experiences and achievements at the Southwest Wine Center.

#### Spanish ServSafe Manager Certification Training

Nineteen individuals participated in the Spanish ServSafe Manager Certification Training at the Sedona Center. All participants are professionals currently working in the food and beverage industry. We are delighted with the strong turnout for this first-time offering. In fact, one local restaurant has already reached out to **Carl Miller**, Culinary Faculty Program Director, and plans to close its doors next month to bring their entire staff in for the same training.

A special thank you to the following individuals for their contributions to the success of this training:

A few areas were identified for improvement to better serve our audience and to continue the success with this industry training in the Sedona community.

#### CTEC, Division 1

Fall enrollment is up 7.7% in headcount and 9.4% in student credit hours. CTED enrollment is up 80 students which is an increase of 34% from last year. Plus, 111 additional students were added from the CTED's high-demand enrollment.

Construction faculty **Brian Magarrell** and some of his students made good progress on the 3D concrete printed house this summer. Division 1 was fortunate to have grant money available to pay for these folks' hard work. See the attached pictures.

The welding program received a new robotic welder over the summer and will be setting up soon. This welder uses dropdown menus, so students no longer need to learn g-code to program the machine.

Electrical & instrumentation is starting to replace its aging cohort of Fanuc robots with new ones from Kuka. They are also working to reproduce their lab in a digital format to test fidelity and quality of instruction and to see if they can reach a wider audience while still maintaining their standards. Finally, to reinforce safe practices, they are creating high-resolution, slow-motion videos of exploding electronics to demonstrate possible issues in the lab and the field.

#### **Adult Basic Education (ABE)**

This year, in partnership with Yavapai College's Commercial Driver's Training program at the Chino Valley campus, the Workforce Education program under the Adult Basic Education Department has made significant strides in workforce education with the launch of a unique and innovative pilot program—the Vocational ESL Commercial Driver's License (VESL CDL) program. This initiative helps non-native English speakers in Arizona gain employment as licensed commercial drivers. The VESL CDL's first student, Candelario Mesa Cosio, who had limited English skills, achieved remarkable success, recently earning his Commercial Driver's License on July 2, 2024.

Candelario Mesa Cosio, the first graduate of the VESL CDL program, exemplifies the dedication and perseverance that Yavapai College seeks to instill in its students. Candelario diligently worked to enhance his vocational English, prepare for CDL exams, improve his communication skills, and master the practical aspects of operating commercial trucks. His journey culminated in passing the ADOT Road Test and Pre-Trip Inspection in English, a testament to his determination and hard work. His success has not only opened up new career opportunities but has also provided economic benefits for his family. Candelario serves as an inspiration to his peers and instructors alike, demonstrating the true potential of the VESL CDL program.

The 22 months of planning, developing, and refining the VESL CDL program have yielded significant results, setting the stage for future VESL initiatives at Yavapai College. The success of the VESL CDL program can be attributed to the dedication of Dawnette Polland, ABE Workforce Education Coordinator, and Dr. Alexander Barber, CDT Instructor. Their efforts in creating a vocational curriculum tailored for non-native English speakers, developing specialized English/Spanish study materials, and providing one-on-one support have been instrumental in the achievements of both the students and the program.

The VESL CDL team is proud of this success and envisions how the program's model can be applied to other workforce programs at the college, benefiting our community, county, and students. As our students' economic status improves, it will enhance their families' financial stability. Looking ahead, the VESL CDL team is eager to welcome more students into the program this fall.

#### REDC & SBDC 1

The REDC continues fostering collaborations and connecting businesses and organizations that stimulate growth. Katherine Anderson & Corey Carlson from REDC presented updates on workforce trends at the Prescott Area Human Resources Association.





The SBDC at Yavapai College extended their outreach in 2024 to Yavapai's rural communities, supporting small business owners get access to affordable working capital congruent with smart business plans. The SBDC displayed their extensive knowledge by supporting the Moonshot competition winner, Puzzle Rides.

#### **Nursing, Health Sciences, Division 2**

The Nursing Department continues to excel in student success and program innovation. The May 2024 cohort achieved a 94% pass rate for first-time testers, and 63.8% of respondents have already secured positions in the healthcare field. This Fall, the department made strategic changes to the curriculum, moving Pediatric and Obstetric content to the second semester to better align with industry standards and support smoother transitions for LPN-RN Advanced Placement students.

The BSN program has seen robust growth, with 190 students enrolled this Fall and 87 new students accepted. Thirteen students are on track to graduate in December 2024, marking another successful year for the program. The RN-BSN program has also made significant strides, being accepted as a candidate for accreditation. A self-study report is due in January 2025, with a site visit scheduled for March 2025. This candidacy is a crucial step forward in our mission to provide comprehensive, high-quality nursing education.

Significant milestones were also achieved in grant funding, with the HB2691 grant enabling a 24% increase in enrollment, reaching full capacity with 62

students in Fall 2024. Enrollment remains strong across the AAS program, with a total of 223 students this Fall.

Accreditation is a key focus, with the AAS program fully accredited through 2029 and the RN-BSN program progressing toward full accreditation.

## Perseverance in the Face of Adversity: Laura Prokopec's Journey to Becoming a Nurse

My name is **Laura Prokopec**, and since I was a child, I have always dreamed of becoming a nurse. However, as life would have it, I didn't get to start my career until later in life. In 2020, my husband passed away unexpectedly, leaving me a single mom of three teenagers. It was at this time that I made the decision to move my kids and I up to Prescott from the Phoenix area. With my parents' support, I was able to return to school full-time and was accepted into YC's nursing program in the Fall of 2023.

I completed my first semester, but as I have become all too familiar with life's unexpected challenges, another bump was placed in my path. In January, I was diagnosed with DCIS breast cancer. I made the decision to opt for a double mastectomy, and according to my oncologists, they believed I would be cancer-free after the procedure. I had my surgery in early May and was well on my way to a full recovery. It was surprisingly easier than I had expected, and I was thrilled to be cancer-free. But once again, nothing is ever certain.

Two weeks prior to the upcoming Fall semester, a follow-up with the oncology team resulted in another devastating diagnosis: the cancer had returned, this time as triple-negative and extremely aggressive. At my age, there was no time to wait. I began my first round of chemo the same week I started the

semester. As difficult as this news was, and knowing how challenging it would be to complete school while undergoing treatment, I also knew that school would be my motivation to keep moving forward and not delay my dream any further.

I am incredibly thankful for Yavapai's amazing professors and administration, who have been so supportive and helpful! After all, we are all nurses, and compassion runs in our blood. Through all this turmoil, I know it will make me a better, more well-rounded nurse since I've experienced so much firsthand. I will be more equipped to empathize with my future patients.

#### Allied Health, Health Sciences, Division 2

 Behavioral Health Technician (BHT): Strong enrollment, leading to an increase in course caps to accommodate up to 40 students per class.

Nursing Assistant (NA): Continues to grow, offering 3-week and 16-week options and will expand to Verde every summer starting in 2025. State pass rates for 2024 are strong, with 81% passing the knowledge exam and 90% passing the skills exam. A new full-time faculty member has been added to support this growth.

- The new LPN Fast Track Program launched in Fall 2024 and is fully enrolled with 20 students and has an alternate list. Funded by a Department of Labor grant, the program includes two new full-time instructors, a simulation lab in Prescott Valley, and \$25,000 in tuition support per cohort through 2028. The application cycle is open for Spring 2025.
- The LPN Step Out is scheduled to resume in Spring 2025, with an updated curriculum that aligns with recent updates in the Nursing program. This option

- allows third-semester RN students to step out and take a 1.5-credit scope and NCLEX prep class, enabling them to work during the remainder of the RN program or to exit with a living wage career. The last cohort from Spring 2024 achieved a 100% pass rate on the NCLEX-PN, underscoring the effectiveness of this pathway.
- The Phlebotomy program continues to have strong enrollment and is the only
  one in Northern Arizona approved by the Governor's Office of Highway Safety for
  the Phlebotomy for Law initiative. The inaugural summer class pictured below
  was a success, supported by 47 community agencies.



• Allied Health now offers an online Medical Records/Medical Office program as a transition pathway for students not pursuing direct patient care but providing skills for immediate employment. The department also provides Basic Life Support (BLS) courses for students and the community. Partnerships with local Career and Technical Education Districts (CTED) support dual and concurrent enrollment opportunities for high school students in key programs. A new clinical coordinator started on September 2<sup>nd</sup> and will play a key role in supporting future growth.

#### Radiology, Health Sciences, Division 2

 The Radiology Department has seen increased enrollment across all programs, with 13 students in the current cohort and 15 new students starting. The MRI certificate program has 1 student enrolled, and the CT certificate program has 4 students enrolled. Our students achieved an 80% pass rate on their first attempt, within our accreditation limits, with one more student scheduled to take the test this month.

Additionally, we have submitted the Limited X-Ray Machine Operator Certificate curriculum and reviewed the Radiologic Technology AAS to ensure a seamless transition for advanced placement students. Barriers have been reduced by decreasing the program's total credit hours from 76 to 64.

Additionally, they attended the L.E.A.D.
Conference – Day of Leadership hosted by **Janice Soutee**, further enriching their experience.

#### Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER)

- The HPER Department is experiencing significant growth, with the addition of Nutrition to our Exercise, Physical Education, and Recreation classes. They are expanding their offerings in Spring 2025 to include new classes such as Climbing at Gripstone Climbing Gym, Dance Fitness and Yoga, and additional Aqua Fit classes, our most popular offering.
- This Fall 2024, they added a Face-to-Face Nutrition class for our student-athletes at the request of the ELT. The summer semester was also very successful, with all classes filled and no cancellations. Swim School ran again this summer, serving 257 individuals aged 3 to 15 across three sessions, generating \$15,420 in revenue.

Additionally, all full-time faculty and staff can use their tuition waiver to enroll in activity classes or purchase a discounted pass to access the pool and Fitness Center.

#### Resilience and Community: The Healing Power of Fitness and Friendship

A dedicated student who has been attending agua aerobics classes for many years tragically lost her husband in a car accident last month. Despite this profound loss, she asked her instructor not to withdraw her from the class. expressing her intention to return after a period of mourning. Once she was ready, she rejoined her agua aerobics class. This emphasizes the importance that HPER physical activity classes, along with the friendships and connections built within them, can have during challenging times. The continued popularity of the instructors, the supportive

Program students, with many more expected in the future.

#### Fire Science, Public Services, Division 2

• The Fire Science program continues to thrive, with our fire academy consistently filling to capacity and maintaining a high graduation rate of over 95%. We are proud to be the first fire academy in the U.S. to implement physiological monitoring devices for our students, in partnership with Slate Safety Company. Additionally, our academy is the only one in the nation using BOS training for mental health and resiliency, setting a new standard in fire service education.



• Fire Science completed a significant overhaul of our online courses, aligning them with the Quality Matters (QM) initiative, and updated our fire academy program to reflect the latest best practices. Their non-credit offerings are also leading the way, as we became the first college in Arizona to host Fire Instructor I and II classes online, achieving a 99% passing rate on Arizona State Certification Testing.



The Fire Science program's influence continues to grow, with invitations to serve as subject matter experts (SMEs) on state-held training classes and active involvement with Prescott and Cottonwood Fire in developing succession planning and promotional programs. The Fire Science program is gaining increasing recognition and support from both the community and our area stakeholders.

#### NARTA & AJS. Public Services, Division 2

- The Northern Arizona Regional Training Academy (NARTA) began its latest session in July 2024 with 37 recruits, including 10 living in the new Prescott Pines Camp, representing 12 different agencies. As we approach NARTA's 30th Anniversary in 2026, early planning for this milestone celebration is underway.
- The AJS program has seen a 9.9% increase in Fall 2024 enrollment. We are also developing a new 15-credit Victim Advocacy certificate, which will include five courses. AJS-101 Introduction to the Administration of Justice launched as the latest OER course in the AJS program on August 17th, with AJS-123 Ethics in Criminal Justice following in Spring 2025.
- There are now two Yavapai College Students serving as AmeriCorps Interns, each providing 8 hours a week in projects serving both the Yavapai College Justice Institute and the Yavapai College Respect Campaign. These students will provide 300 hours of service from August to May next year, earning a stipend and a scholarship from Arizona Serves. We are also working to add dual enrollment for AJS courses at Bradshaw Mountain High School, starting in Fall 2025.

• The Law and Justice Club participated in Club Rush this week, attracting 18 new members. • The Respect Campaign, chaired by Brandelyn Andres, has been promoting equality, cultural intelligence, multiculturalism, and social justice at Yavapai College since 2016. The campaign focuses on fostering open dialogue and modeling respect as a core value essential for democratic civil society. Key activities include celebrating International Peace Day, World Adoption Day, Sexual Assault Awareness, and Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The campaign also addresses how to engage in political conversations focused on issues rather than candidates.

#### Paralegal, Public Services, Division 2

The Paralegal program continues to expand, offering an AAS degree and two certificates: Legal Office Clerk, with six high school students enrolled this fall through MICTD!

Legal Paraprofessional is a one-year program regulated by the Arizona Judicial Branch with five areas of endorsement, including a new Juvenile Dependency endorsement starting this fall.

Enrollment is strong, with a 70% fill rate for Fall 2024 classes and a 21% increase in headcount from last year. LAW100, which runs every Fall and Spring, has the highest number of students since August 2022. This year, we plan to seek American Bar Association (ABA) accreditation, which YC previously held but discontinued due to the ABA's stance on online classes. With the ABA's revised position post-COVID-19, it is an ideal time to pursue reaccreditation.

**Tiffany Kragnes**, Paralegal Studies Program Director, recently joined the Yavapai County Bar Association, and the Paralegal Program is a Bronze Sponsor for the Arizona Paralegal Association's annual meeting on September 20th, strengthening our outreach within the legal community.

Additionally, new coursework is being developed in Mediation and Alternative Dispute Resolution to enhance the employability of paralegals, providing them with additional income opportunities and making them more valuable to law firms.

#### **Visual Arts, Division 3**

Earlier this year, members of the Prescott Area Woodturners (PAW), of whom Wood Turning instructor **Dean Humphrey** is a member, approached Dean showing interest in adopting the YC Woodturning program. The club's interest was to assist in adding tools and supplies and build enrollment in our college classes as well as increase membership in PAW.

PAW has for several years donated wood bowls to the Prescott Empty Bowls event held on the county square each fall. The Empty Bowls event raises approximately \$20,000 yearly with proceeds going to local food banks. Dean felt that contributing wood bowls might be a good event for our enrolled students, and in March he asked students if they thought donating their time to make bowls was of interest to them. Many of the Spring semester students, some of whom are PAW members as well, said yes and over the next several months, including students enrolled in the summer session, volunteered and turned bowls for the event.

On Sunday September 8th, YC Woodturning Art students and the Prescott Area Woodturners contributed 250 wood bowls to Empty Bowls. Students along with PAW members also set up a demonstration and display booth on Gurley Street in Prescott. Attendees to the event lined up several hours prior to the event to obtain two bowls of soup donated from local restaurants. Along with their \$20 donation, attendees were given their choice of an artist made ceramic or wood bowl. The wood bowls went extremely fast.


"I feel the event was a huge success for PAW and our college program. I personally talked with dozens of attendees who were not aware of our program and showed strong interest in enrolling in a future class. Three visitors from Phoenix asked if there was a course like ours in the Valley and I told them no, they needed to come to Prescott." says Dean.

Our community can be proud to have such programs available as proven by the adoption of our classes by the Prescott Area Woodturners.

With support from our new Dean, **Bryan Robertson**, my lab techs and I have worked diligently to implement higher safety standards and protocols in our shop with innovative strategies while increasing accessibility to better meet the needs of the variety of students we have in Welded Metal Sculpture. Our YC Faculty show was fantastic and my large-scale, interactive installation, "#EndTrafficking," was successful in spreading awareness about the issue of Human Trafficking due to extensive press coverage thanks to **Michael Grady**, YC Marketing and Communications Specialist. We raised about \$300 with pin sales to donate to The Launch Pad Teen Center. The Arizona Anti-Trafficking Network previously had no hub in Yavapai County, but they are now in connection with The Launch Pad Teen Center. My classes are packed with excited students who travel from as far as Sedona to take advantage of the only Metal Sculpture program in Northern Arizona.
