🏋 YC Agriculture Students Gain Hands-On Experience in Growing and Harvesting

Students in AGS 157 Community Supported Agriculture and AGS 250 Fall Production Horticulture are busy gaining real-world experience in diverse growing environments this season.

- With 2025 shaping up to be a strong fruit year, students have been assisting with continual apple harvests—learning ladder safety, tracking poundage, and seeing their efforts contribute to market outlets including The Eatery on the Prescott Campus.
- Students are also transplanting plugs started in summer courses into larger pots, preparing plants for the annual October Plant Sale. Weekly harvests of fresh leafy greens from the straw bale garden provide additional opportunities for students to apply their skills while supporting campus and community needs.
- These experiences give Agriculture students valuable training in safety, production, and marketing—helping them connect classroom learning to meaningful outcomes in the field.







Culinary, Division 1

Viticulture, Enology, and the Southwest Wine Center

in Vineyard Harvest Brings Record Quality and Community Support

Harvest at the Southwest Wine Center wrapped up in just four weeks this season, producing nearly 50 tons of high-quality fruit. The dry late-season weather reduced disease pressure, making 2025 a standout year for grape quality.

The final pick drew nearly 40 volunteers, highlighting the community's strong support for YC Viticulture and Enology students and their work in the vineyard.

Mine & Dine Event Sets New Record for Support

The annual Wine and Dine fundraising event, scheduled for October 25, is already shaping up to be a major success. With nearly \$60,000 raised in sponsorships before ticket sales close, the event has surpassed last year's total.

Hosted by the Yavapai College Foundation and Friends of the Southwest Wine Center, the evening supports Viticulture & Enology scholarships, experiential learning, and program priorities. A new venue promises to re-energize the event, bringing fresh excitement to this signature community celebration.

5 Sharing YC Wines at Symphony Fundraiser

On August 30, the Southwest Wine Center participated in the Flagstaff Symphony's "Sippin' with the Symphony" annual fundraiser. As the official wine donor, YC introduced its wines to patrons and supporters—an invaluable opportunity to showcase student-crafted vintages to a broader audience.



Verde Valley Skilled Trades Center

Skilled Trades Students Complete Fourth Tiny House

Since the Skilled Trades Center opened in 2021, each Basic Carpentry cohort has contributed to the construction of a tiny house, with Electrical, HVAC, and Plumbing students also playing key roles.

Most recently, students completed the fourth tiny house during the 2024–25 academic year. All four completed homes were relocated to an adjacent lot, where they will serve future housing needs—tangible results of student learning in action.

Thorticulture Students Launch Community Plant Cart

The new self-serve plant cart outside the Verde Campus greenhouse offers surplus student-grown plants to the community at affordable prices. Inspired by past students, the cart was built by Carpentry students under the guidance of Adjunct Instructor Paul Grasso—another example of cross-program collaboration at YC.

Proceeds from plant sales directly support Horticulture programs. Recent harvests of student-grown produce—including tomatoes, cucumbers, and garlic—were donated to Manzanita Outreach, reinforcing the program's impact on local food security.

TC Students Gain From National Spotlight on OER in Legal Education

Dr. Tiffany Kragnes, Professor of Law at Yavapai College, was selected to present at the 2025 CALIcon Conference, held June 5–6 at Georgia State School of Law in Atlanta.

Her session, "When All You've Ever Used is Textbooks: Changing Your Mindset on OER for Legal Education," detailed the emotional journey of moving away from traditional textbooks to create an entire Introduction to Paralegal Studies course now shared through OERizona.

Pr. Kragnes also highlighted Yavapai College's OER grant funding—set to expire in August 2025—and the College's initiative to continue supporting faculty in building open, affordable, and student-focused courses.

By leading in this national conversation, YC is ensuring that students have greater access to high-quality, cost-free learning materials—an innovation that removes barriers and empowers student success.

Division Three, Performing Arts Department



The festival concluded with *Silent Symphony*: a sold-out screening of a 1922 silent Tom Mix film shot in the Grand Canyon, accompanied live by The Mont Alto Motion Picture Orchestra from Colorado.

Division four, Education, English, Humanities, Social/Behavioral Sciences

 EDU and ECE news: We are working with two childcare centers to offer classes in an Apprenticeship Program administered through DES and Central Arizona College. Participants take classes with YC while completing other apprenticeship requirements and earn incentives, like higher pay, to participate: Central Arizona College Partners with Apprentix to Launch Early Childhood Education Apprenticeship Program

We are building an Ed Professions program on this side of the mountain (with MICTED) and have ten participants. We plan to create an in-person cohort next year and will work through the scheduling/transportation challenges.

Dr. Tara O'Neill (Early Childhood Education) was interviewed for a September 1 *Courier* article, "Education professions program offers opportunities for high schoolers", about YC's efforts to improve teacher education here in Northern Arizona.

Dr. O'Neill was also recognized at the August 2025 Convocation for earning the prestigious YC President's Award.

The Division also onboarded three new full-time professors what started teaching Fall 2025: **Eric Hill** (English), **Dr. Chris Harrison** (Political Science and History), and **Dr. Matthew Goodwin** (Philosophy and Religion). They will help meet the growing student demand for quality transferable general education courses here in Northern Arizona.

Finally, **Arie Boelts**, our talented Instructional Support Specialist (ISS), earned a master's degree in literature from ASU this May 2025.



Family Enrichment Center (FEC)

The FEC Welcomes its New Director



The Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center (FEC) on the Yavapai College Prescott campus was pleased to welcome its new Director, **Dr. Eric Bucher**, in July 2025. The FEC Director is responsible for directing the FEC laboratory school serving children ages 3 months to 5 years, including all aspects of planning, managing, supervising, and coordinating the operations of the child development center and implementing a high-quality early learning program for the children of students, staff, faculty, and the community.

Dr. Bucher comes to the FEC with two decades of experience in Arizona's early childhood education field. Over his distinguished career, Dr. Bucher has taught children birth to age 5 as a preschool teacher, designed early learning activities at a science museum, managed multimillion-dollar preschool programs, and directed a non-profit that provided training for childcare providers. He also has a decade of experience teaching students as part-time faculty in an

accredited early childhood degree program at a community college.

Dr. Bucher holds a Doctor of Education in Leadership & Innovation from Arizona State University and a master's early childhood leadership from Northern Arizona University. His research expertise is high-quality infant/toddler care, ongoing professional development educators, preschool science activities, and state and federal early learning policy. Dr. Bucher co-led the statewide advocacy campaign with local parents, educators, and businesses that resulted in a \$12 million

investment in 2024 to help working families across Arizona access high-quality childcare, which was the first infusion of public childcare dollars in 15 years.

De. Bucher has lived in Arizona for more than 25 years and grew up in rural Tennessee. His parents both served in the U.S. Air Force, and he deeply believes in serving the community and ensuring young children and their families have high-quality early learning opportunities to grow and thrive.

FEC Coordinator Receives Roughrider High Five Award

In June 2025, **Nicole Moore**, MBA, the FEC coordinator, was recognized with the YC Roughrider High Five Award from the Yavapai College Staff Association (YCSA) Employee Recognition Team. Nicole received the award for her thoughtful collaboration with the YC fiscal department in streamlining processes like reporting and communication. Nicole explained, "[This award] symbolizes teamwork, uplifting our colleagues, and striving for excellence. When effort is recognized, the natural progression leads to timeliness and efficiency in processes!"

What is Quality Early Learning at the FEC?

Children's earliest years are a time of rapid brain development and learning. Research shows that high-quality early childhood experiences set a positive trajectory for children's Kindergarten readiness skills and lifelong learning outcomes. High-quality early childhood education helps children be ready for school and set for life.

The FEC is both a 5-Star rated Quality First participating childcare provider (out of 5-Stars) and is currently nationally accredited by the National Accreditation Commission for Early Care and Education Programs (NAC). This means that the FEC has demonstrated teaching practices and early learning environments that meet high-quality state and national standards and is committed to engaging in continuous quality improvement processes to provide the best learning experiences for young children.

What are some of the high-quality standards you will see implemented at the FEC?



Children's trust and security are developed through consistent, responsive, nurturing teachers.



Language and reading are promoted through daily conversations, reading of books, and singing.



There is time in the daily schedule for extended play-based learning and knowledge-building indoors and outdoors.



Lesson plans support children's whole development, based on early learning guidelines and best practice.



Children learn science and math through hands-on exploration with openended materials.



Healthy habits are formed through nutritious foods, family-style meals, and proper handwashing.

 Yavapai College's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) attends National Leadership Conference

Yavapai College's FBLA chapter made its return to the National Leadership Conference for the first time in 24 years this past summer in Dallas, TX—and they did not come home empty-handed. The chapter earned several prestigious awards, both at the chapter and individual levels.

YC was named a 2024–25 Distinguished Chapter, one of just eleven collegiate programs recognized nationwide. They also received the Golden Seal Chapter Award, an honor given to only 15% of FBLA chapters across the country. In addition, Yavapai College was recognized as Arizona's Outstanding Chapter of the Year, and **Deanna Baker** was named Arizona's Outstanding Advisor of the Year.

On the competition side, this was the final round of business events the students had been preparing for all year—and their hard work paid off.

OERizona Network Leadership Summit

Yavapai College continues to serve as a statewide leader in Open Educational Resources (OER) through its leadership of the OERizona Network, a grassroots coalition of Arizona's public colleges and universities advancing access, affordability, and innovation in higher education. With **Megan Crossfield** as the current board president, YC plays a leading role in guiding statewide strategy and collaboration.

This summer, YC hosted the second annual OERizona Leadership Summit, convening faculty, staff, and administrators from across Arizona to engage in strategic planning and share best practices. The summit reaffirmed YC's position as a hub of innovation and student-centered leadership.

In addition, the Network concluded its 2023–2024 data collection cycle, with institutions reporting over **\$8 million** in student textbook savings across the state—**\$1.2 million of which came from Arizona's rural community colleges**. Yavapai College's ongoing leadership, infrastructure support, and advocacy continue to drive meaningful, measurable impact on student affordability and academic success.
