## Division One, Commercial Driver Training

### **CDL Graduate Credits YC Training for Launching His Dream Career**

A recent Commercial Driver Training (CDT) graduate is seeing the payoff of his hard work—and the quality of his YC education. Jesse Nagle, a proud YC alumnus, shared an inspiring update after being recruited by Schneider National and successfully completing his second week of orientation training.

Jesse highlighted how prepared he felt compared to trainees from other states, crediting Yavapai College for providing exceptional, hands-on instruction. He shared that his:

-  Backing skills stood out
-  Highway driving felt natural and confident
-  Pre-trip inspections exceeded expectations

Perhaps most meaningful was Jesse's message to future students—encouraging them to listen closely, trust the process, and fully engage in the training. His confidence behind the wheel, he said, came directly from the skills and standards instilled during his time at YC.

#### **From the student (email excerpt):**

*"I got recruited to Schneider National Trucking... My backup skills were amazing. My highway skills were perfect. My pre inspection trip was better than all the other states. I knew what I was doing, and I thank you guys for what you taught me... Thank you so much for allowing me to live my dream."*

Academics from Washington State, New Mexico and California will travel to the Verde Campus to present to our winemaking and winegrowing community 🍇 🍷 .

The Southwest Wine Center has been entered in a first of its kind “College Wine Bowl” at the 2026 San Francisco Chronicle’s Wine Competition. Colleges and Universities will go head-to-head (via the judge’s tasting notes and opinions) in a football-playoff themed approach 🏈 🍷 , with one academic program being named the champion 🏆 ! ## Division One, Skilled Trades Center

### Skilled Trades Center

On 12/17/25, 7 Prescott Valley building inspectors/professionals attended a focused professional development training, “Carpentry: Guards, Handrails, Stairs and Landings” at the Yavapai College Verde Valley Skilled Trades Center. The session was led by Brian Pearson, YC’s Verde Valley campus Carpentry & Plumbing faculty with 45 years of professional experience, including 13 years as the City of Sedona Plans Examiner/Inspector. Designed to address the rapid evolution of building codes and construction practices, the training reinforced current code requirements through hands-on, real-world examples. Participants strengthened their ability to interpret standards, identify compliance issues, and apply best practices related to guards, handrails, stairs, and landings.

Coming up in January and February 2026, 4 additional trainings in this series will take place on topics ranging from HVAC Duct Design & Airflow to Safety Compliance, Building Trusses, and Drywall, Insulation, and Weather Proofing. This training series highlights Yavapai College’s continued commitment to workforce development and continuing education , supporting local communities by providing practical, trade-based learning that promotes safe, code-compliant construction across Yavapai County.







## Division Two, Aviation



### **YC Aviation Student Earns Private Pilot Certificate in Record Time**

On Wednesday, November 5, 2025, Chris Dollesin earned his FAA Private Pilot Certificate after a successful checkride with FAA Designated Pilot Examiner Daniel Knight—an exceptional achievement completed in just 2.5 months from the start of the semester.

A U.S. Air Force Veteran, Chris trained under Instructor Tom Lynn and became the first student in Yavapai College's Fall 2025 Aviation Cohort to complete certification—an accelerated timeline that's virtually unheard of in flight training.

This milestone highlights Chris's dedication and focus, as well as the speed, structure, and quality of YC's Professional Pilot Program, where motivated students can move quickly from the classroom to the cockpit. We're proud of Chris and excited to see him continue his journey as he begins Instrument Training this semester—congratulations on an outstanding accomplishment!

### YC Students Engage in Adoption & Foster Care Awareness Event

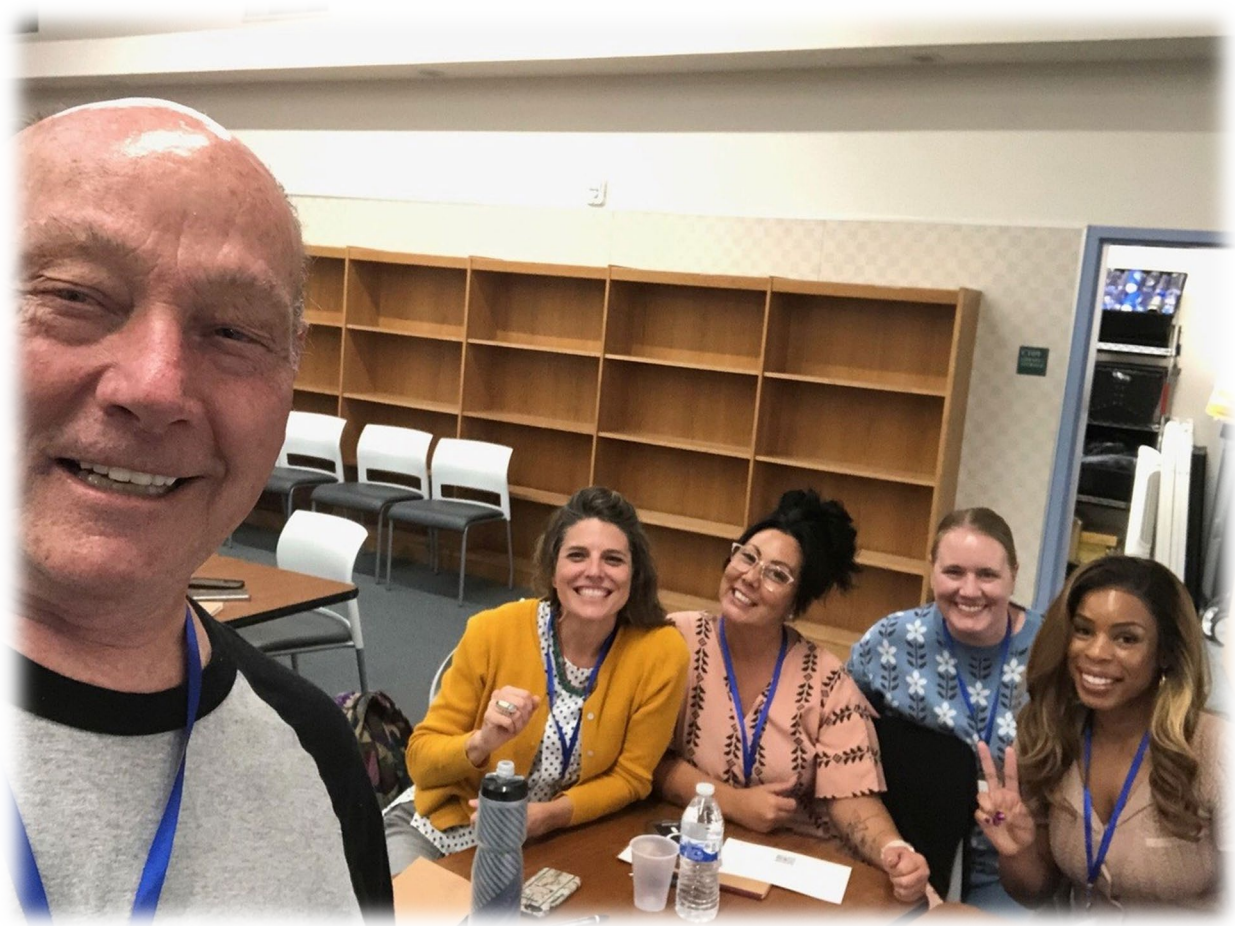


## YC Advances Family Support Strategies That Benefit Students & Communities

On November 19, 2025 YC students and families stand to benefit from important collaborative work led by **Brandelyn Andres** and Dr. Joani Fisher, who were invited to participate in a Family Impact Summit brainstorming and goal-setting session at the **Glendale Caring Center**.

Hosted by **Prevent Child Abuse Arizona**, the summit brought together community leaders focused on supporting families *before* they experience crisis. Both presenters are certified Protective Factors trainers, equipping them to share evidence-based strategies that strengthen family stability—an essential foundation for student success.

During the session, Brandelyn and Joani presented the **Actively Caring 4 People** model, demonstrating how communities can work together to wrap supportive resources around families so they can thrive. This leadership and collaboration directly enhance YC's ability to support students through stronger, more connected communities—creating environments where learning, growth, and resilience can flourish.

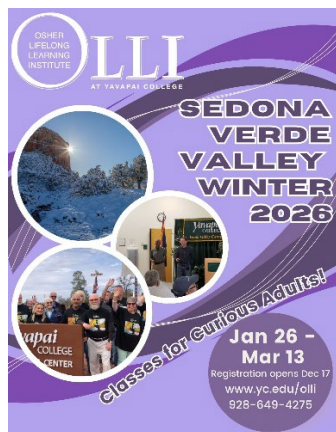

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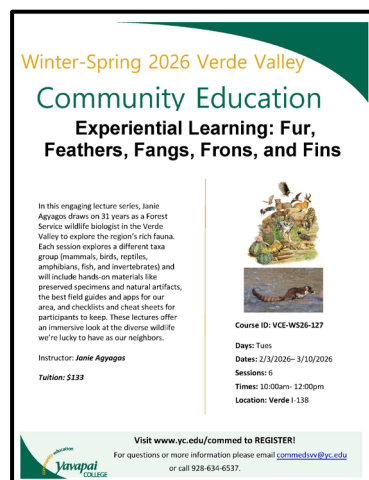

- Instructor **Amanda (Mandy) Atherton's** Precalculus Mat 183 students demonstrated their knowledge of Trig equations (like Sine, Cosine, and Tangent) multiple ways in the projects pictured below. The one requirement was that students modeled a real-life application and creatively demonstrated their learning. This was a project where the student becomes an expert and the instructor gets to learn new things.

The students from this semester really went above and beyond with projects ranging from a Rubens tube to a welding demonstration of AC current.



## Office of Instructional Support

- Assessment Day 2025 was held on Friday, September 26<sup>th</sup> for all full-time faculty and cocurricular staff at Yavapai College. Yavapai College supports the assessment process by supporting an annual Assessment Day in September hosted by the Office of Instructional Support and the following faculty committees: Student Learning Outcomes Assessment, Curriculum, and General Education. Activities during assessment day are designed as both professional development in the areas of course and program assessment and a work session for faculty to engage in dialogue that allow them to discuss assessment results, complete reports, and to make assessment plans for the coming academic year. There were 144 participants, including 91 faculty and 52 staff and leadership members. The day offered four faculty tracks (Assessment Foundations, General Education Assessment, AI in Assessment, and YC Assessment Processes) and two cocurricular assessment sessions for Student Affairs and Library & Tutoring Services
