

- Community Ed will offer a second Yoga Teacher Training, a 200-hour certificate course, is taking place this Summer at the Sedona Center. This \$2,499 program is a substantial savings over other programs, and results in an industry-respected teaching certificate.
- YC is partnering with the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension to offer Certified Professional Food Manager (CPFM) certification. CPFM is an industry-required training for many food service careers.



- Enrollments for Session B are looking good for the Prescott CommEd programs!
 - o 166 Students are enrolled in 22 Session B courses.
 - We are still offering a 50% discount to YC staff/faculty for courses making but still have space. Call 928-717-7755 to process the discount at registration.
- One hundred seventeen students are enrolled on 16 EDV trips
 - Five trips have open seats.
- Fifty-five students are enrolled in 17 YC Companion courses
 - o Eleven are enrolled in two late start courses.
- Prescott CommEd is working with Athletics to offer Soccer, Basketball and Baseball youth camps through the CampusCE registration system.
 - o Eighteen students are enrolled in four spring camps as of 3-22-22.
- We are working to complete the summer College for Kids and Adult CommEd schedules.


