

On April 3rd and 4th, the Yavapai College Respect Campaign and Justice Institute welcomed students and community members to the 2025 Peace Summit, held in Building 19–147. With the theme "How our individual efforts to live a peaceful, civil life can influence the greater good," students had the opportunity to learn, reflect, and connect through a wide range of experiences.



Student Voices at the Center – A total of 66 students from 8 different disciplines attended one or more of the summit's 11 sessions, exploring topics from personal peace to community impact. The summit concluded with a student-led panel discussion featuring SGA officers, offering insight into how students are putting these ideas into practice.



Art, Music, and Movement as Expressions of Peace – In collaboration with the Art Department and YC Art Gallery, a call to artists brought in 26 powerful works reflecting peace and mindfulness. Many of the artists were current YC art students, and several spoke during the Friday morning opening session to share the stories behind their work. Sessions also highlighted the role of music, dance, and creative expression in fostering peace.

• YC Fire Science Students Train for Real-World Emergencies

Yavapai College Fire Science students have been putting their skills to the test through a series of hands-on training sessions designed to prepare them for the challenges of reallife emergency response. These recent experiences have given students critical exposure to high-risk situations they'll face in the field.

Hazardous Materials Training – Students learned how to safely respond to hazardous substance incidents by practicing decontamination procedures and hazard mitigation techniques. This training helps future firefighters protect themselves and others in dangerous chemical or biological situations.



• **Fire Dynamics & Flow Path Training** – Inside a simulated burn building, students observed how fire and smoke move through a structure, giving them valuable insight into how to predict fire behavior and plan safe rescues during real incidents.

Wehicle Extrication Training – In another live scenario, students practiced removing victims from crashed vehicles, learning proper techniques and tools to manage car accident rescue operations safely.



These high-impact learning opportunities help YC Fire Science students build confidence, sharpen decision-making skills, and prepare for life-saving careers. The more they train now, the stronger and safer their response will be when it matters most.



Division 3, Film and Media Arts



- Instructor Dana Kirkwood-Watts Publication "Exploring Biology Students' Online Search Strategies" is to be published in the upcoming Journal of Science Education and Technology. A new journal article by Dr. Dana Kirkwood-Watts, Associate Professor, Microbiology highlights how biology students approach online research when answering homework questions. In this study, students were observed and interviewed as they navigated the internet for biology-related information. Key findings include frequent use of Wikipedia, although there is a shared consensus that it is not a reliable source of information, dependence on Google Snippets, and preference for known science-based websites such as NCBI and Nature. - Sara Cooper, Math Professor, is proud to share that all Yavapai College Math courses except for Calculus III and Differential Equations are offered using Online Educational Resources (OER) at little or no cost to students. Over the last 5 years, these resources have saved students close to a million dollars in textbook costs. For the current spring semester, online educational resources saved students \$193,500 compared to textbooks costs.
