



The Performing Arts Department recently concluded an 8-performance run of the musical, *Singin' in the Rain*, which was attended by over 5,100 appreciative patrons of the Jim & Linda Lee Performing Arts Center. The production, which began choreography rehearsals in June and staging rehearsals in August, was comprised of a cast of 30 (including a mix of traditional YC students, local high schoolers, and community members); a 20-member pit orchestra comprised of a mix of student, faculty, and professional instrumentalists, which was expertly conducted by **Professor Chris Tenney**; and a skilled production team of dozens lead by **Kate Howell** as Director and **Dr. Craig John Ralston** as Production Director. With production values and performances to rival those of the best theatres in the state, *Singin' in the Rain* demonstrates that Yavapai College continues to provide exceptional, invaluable opportunities for those who wish to further their education and gain practical experience in the Performing Arts.




Verde Valley Campus

In our winemaking endeavors, students are nearing the completion of the largest wine vintage since the Southwest Wine Center's establishment. A cool spring and delayed start to summer push the harvest two weeks later than our historical average. However, the quality was high due to the extra hang time on the vines.









The tasting room has expanded the Educational Wine Tasting Experiences. These sessions, featuring instruction on wine history and sensory evaluation, aim to attract and educate potential students about wine and our program.
