# Student Engagement and Leadership (SEL)


### Pizza and Ping Pong with the Provost

**Ruff's Closet** sponsored a Coat Drive before and after winter break with seventy-two coats distributed through the end of January.




## **Certified Peer Educator (CPE)Training Program**

## **Financial Aid**

Every year the Financial Aid Office goes through an Annual Audit. The results from the Audit are required to be turned into the Department of ED, by March 31st for the previous academic year. Hundreds of files are reviewed each year by the auditors. This academic year we provided over 1000 screenshots with regulatory justification.

The Financial Aid Office once again has had **no** audit findings for the 9th year in a row! This is quite an accomplishment, and we are **proud of the FA team**, especially navigating the Financial Aid and Department of ED turmoil caused by FAFSA Complications.

## **Basic Needs**

#### **YC Food Pantry**

The YC Food Pantry is in full swing with 36 visits booked in January! This is an uptick from 27 visits in January of 2024.

The next **Community Mobile Food Distribution** will be held on March 28<sup>th</sup>, from 10:00 – 1:00. All community members are welcome to drive through and pick up meat, dairy, bread, drinks and snacks.

#### The Basic Needs Office Gets a Therapist

After several months of negotiations, a therapist from Spectrum Healthcare is now on the Prescott campus one day per week, to provide in-person therapy to our students who are on AHCCCS. This is a very important service for our students who prefer in-person therapy and can't find the time to get to an appointment off campus.

#### **Helping Students get to Class**

The Basic Needs Office has been working hard to enhance public transportation options for YC students, including expanding routes that connect our CTEC, Prescott Valley, Chino Valley, and Prescott campuses. Set to launch on July 1, 2025, the Yavaline Regional Transit System (YAV Connect) will introduce expanded microtransit services across the tri-city area. This service will offer direct rides, allowing students to travel from their homes to any destination within the tri-city area for a low fee of \$1.00 to \$2.00 per trip. This is an exciting development for our students who rely on public transportation!
